n early July, Charles Moore, editor of and contributor to the book, "Called to Community" and his wife Leslie were our guests at First Christian Church. Many of us met for lunch and conversation with them as they shared insights from their life living in Christian community.

In chapter 13 of the book (that contains 52 short chapters – one for each week of the year), Charles Moore writes, "At one level or another, all of us want to be connected with others. But what does it mean to connect? What does it take to forge relationships that count?" "Jesus prayed that we might be a community, that his followers would possess the togetherness and love and unity that he and [God] have for each other (John 17:20-26)." Throughout the New Testament there is an emphasis on the mutually caring relationships and sense of belonging within the faith community. It

shows up as "one another."

Here are just a few verses:

Live in harmony with one another. Wait for one another. Have the same care for one another. Bear one another's burdens. Build one another up. Be at peace with one another. Do good to one another. Forgive one another.

Beginning Wednesday, October 2, there will be a gathering of people who will meet weekly to read a chapter from the book and reflect on the intersection of faith and life with "one another." Those wishing or needing to eat will first gather at 6:00 pm downstairs and share a meal together with Food at First, then head up to the Hub just off the elevator on 2<sup>nd</sup> floor.

The intention of the group is to study, pray, and share life as we seek to follow Jesus. The hope in gathering is to get to know one another and care for one another more fully and authentically as part of the community of Christ. The prayer is that we will build one other up in faith and in love. Please let me know if you are interested, if you need childcare, and if you have any questions. There are a few of the books available in the Church Office for \$5 on a first come, first serve basis.

The 2020 Vision adopted by our church names this work as one of the four priorities of our mission together as a whole church. This voluntary annual offering is the only source of funding for this ministry.


### The form of this ministry may be changing, but the need for addressing racism has never been more obvious.

### 2019 CROP Walk on October 13

The 2019 Ames Area CROP Walk will be held on **Sunday, October 13**, starting at the Maple Shelter in Brookside Park. Sign-in will begin at 1:00 p.m. and the walk itself will start promptly at 1:30 p.m. As in years past, the walk is approximately 5 kilometers long (3.1 miles), passing through the ISU campus, north on Stange Road to 13<sup>th</sup> Street, and back through Brookside Park, returning to the Maple Shelter.

Money raised through the CROP Walk helps to fund food programs sponsored around the world by Church World Service. In addition, 25% of the total amount raised by Ames-area walkers is earmarked for *local* food programs right here in our community.


We recognize that



### DISCIPLES OF CHRIST FAIR TRADE PROJECT AND THE HUMAN STORY BEHIND A CASHEW



f you've never ordered from Equal Exchange's Disciples of Christ Fair Trade project, now is a great time to give it a try! Equal Exchange helps small farmers earn sustainable wages through fairly traded coffee, teas, chocolate and other foods. For Equal Exchange, fair trade means more than paying fair prices. Equal Exchange trades only with democratically-organized farmer small cooperatives, where men and women get to vote together on how to use fair trade premiums in their communities. Here is the human story behind one of these foods - the cashew - and how fair trade helps cashew farmers strengthen their communities:

"Farmers are proudly reclaiming an island where El Salvador's civil war once raged. After struggling for peasant rights and suffering violent reprisals during the country's 12-year civil war, they received land through a government land reform program. These 60 farmers now grow exquisite cashews in a protected mangrove sanctuary and are learning how to run a Fair Trade farming co-operative. In India, protecting both elephants and crops with elephantfriendly fencing is just one way that [cashew] farmers have used Fair Trade premiums to improve their farming. They have also channeled funds to improve school facilities, support community drinking water programs and control weeds sustainably."

If you like dark chocolate, Equal Exchange is now offering its darkest chocolate bar ever with 92% chocolate. This is the result of a new chocolate partnership in West Africa, where child labor and forced labor in the cocoa industry are a major

problem. Small scale farmers in Togo are now supplying organic and fair trade cocoa beans for Equal Exchange and these partnerships can create meaningful change.

Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) is one of Equal Exchange's interfaith partners. Started in 2008, the Disciples of Christ Fair Trade Project is a collaboration between Equal Exchange, Disciples Home Missions, and Week of Compassion to involve more Disciples in supporting small farmers around the world. For each pound of fairly traded coffee, chocolate, tea, and foods Disciples purchase through the Fair Trade Project, 15 cents per pound goes to the Project's Small Farmer Fund. In 2018, that fund amounted to \$1,105.65.



n Thursday, Sept. 12, 2019, Disciples gathered online and in-person to celebrate our Church's past, present, and future with a giving day for <u>Disciples Mission Fund</u>.

Coordinated by staff in the Office of General Minister and President, over \$25,000 was given by individuals and congregations across the life of the Church on #DMFday.

In Indianapolis, dozens gathered at an open house, hosted by the <u>Indiana region</u>, to celebrate <u>Disciples founder Alexander Campbell</u>'s birthday, the occasion for the giving day. Disciples Center staff also gathered that morning for a building-wide celebration of Disciples Mission Fund, with cake and DMF-themed trivia.

Together, the gifts received on #DMFday make an incredible difference in the life of our Church.

Because of the #DMFday gifts received from people in nearly every region, <u>regional ministries</u> are better positioned to facilitate the search and call process

for discerning ministers, offer youth and family programs, and explore innovative ways to expand our ministries. The Georgia region, for example, is partnering with the <u>National Benevolent</u> <u>Association</u> on a <u>mental health initiative</u>. Because of our shared gifts, this kind of creative collaboration will continue across our Church.

With the help of all those who gave on #DMFday, our general ministries continue their important work to serve from our doorsteps to the ends of the earth. Through <u>Disciples Home Missions</u>, youth groups can serve recovering communities with <u>Disciples Volunteering</u> and young Disciples are exploring Biblical stories through the <u>Children Worship and Wonder</u> program. 


