Revealing Love - Lent 2020

hat does God's love look like? For real? As disciples of Jesus, that question matters. That question guides our thoughts, our attitudes, our perceptions, and our action. This year we've been exploring how God works to fashion a people to care for all that God created, humans as well as all of creation. Our guiding theme for the year is "Journey to the Common Good: Resistance,



Revelation, Revival." Last fall through Advent we explored two sides of resistance; resistance to God, and resistance to forces that keep us from following God's way. Since Christmas we have been exploring revelation. God's love is revealed in Jesus – in Jesus' teachings, healing, preaching, attitudes, perceptions, and actions; in how he relates to people on the margins, and how he relates to people in power; in when Jesus speaks up and when he is silent. During Lent our theme will be "Revealing Love."

Lent is an opportunity for us to go deeper. It is a season in the Christian year intended to be a wilderness experience like that of Jesus as he prepared for his ministry and mission after his baptism. There, in those 40 days and nights (the length of Lent plus the Sundays), Jesus prayed, fasted, and met that which would steer him away from God. It was preparation for continuing on the path of love; the path that leads to life in its fullest as God intends. Lent is an opportunity for us to



follow Jesus on that path to deeper connection to God, ourselves, and others. During this season we will continue our study of the Gospel of Luke. In that gospel, Jesus often says, "Your faith has made you well," or "Your faith has saved you," in response to people taking risks in order to seek wholeness through Jesus. Faith in scripture is not a set of beliefs. It is action based on guidance by and trust in Jesus, and is bathed in love. During Lent we will hear such stories as the Good Samaritan, Lost Sheep and Coins, the Prodigal Son, and Zacchaeus. These stories are filled with God's revealing love; love that leads to abundant life in this world as well as the next. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 26th. That day First Christian Church will host a joint Ash Wednesday Service with First United Methodist Church and United Church of Christ at 7:00 pm. I hope you will plan to be here to begin our Lenten journey together, and to help welcome friends from our neighboring churches.

 - ⇒ Vacation Bible School to be determine, FCC Youth will be assistants.


Easter Morning Breakfast April 12, 2020 following the Sunrise Service

Journey Toward Wholeness:


A History of Black Disciples of Christ in the Mission of the Christian Church by Brenda M. Cardwell and William K. Fox, Sr. (1990)


This is the first volume in a planned two-part series sponsored and published by the National Convocation of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ); v. 1 covers the period from 1700 to 1988. With roots stretching to before the Civil War, the National Convocation of the Christian Church today serves as the connection between African Americans and the Stone-Campbell Movement. Following emancipation, organizations that later became the National Convocation worked to improve the lives of freed slaves and their descendants. This volume chronicles the predecessors of the National Convocation and the movement's roots and growth through almost three centuries.


Ev'ry Time I Feel the Spirit

by Gwendolyn Sims Warren (1999)

For over 200 years in African American churches, music has offered solace and been a source of celebration, leaving a mark not only on the Christian world, but on popular music as well. *Ev'ry Time I Feel the Spirit* contains the lyrics and music of 101 of the most widely known and cherished of these pieces, ranging from spirituals sung during slave times to songs of unity from the civil rights movement and the contemporary era. The book also presents a biography of each composer and the history of the evolution of each song, examining the role it played in enabling African Americans to develop the strength to carry on in the face of adversity.








Let the Trumpet Sound by Stephen B. Oates (1982) and **King Remembered** by Flip Schulke and Penelope O. McPhee (1986)

Here are two very different but equally compelling biographies of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The first is by historian Stephen Oates, who also wrote critically acclaimed biographies of John Brown, Nat Turner, and Abraham Lincoln—all martyrs (like King) in the cause of racial justice. The second, by journalists Flip Schulke and Penelope McPhee, is equal parts biography and photo essay, including the most comprehensive single collection of still photographs of Dr. King's life and times.





The Color of Life: A Journey Toward Love and Racial Justice by Cara Meredith (2019)

Cara Meredith is a writer and speaker with a theology degree from Fuller Seminary. From childhood, she didn't think issues of race had anything to do with her. A colorblind rhetoric had been stamped across her education, world view, and Christian theology. When she met and eventually married the son of black Civil Rights icon James Meredith, she began to listen to the stories and experiences of others in a new way, taking note of the cultures, sounds and shades of life already present around her. *The Color of Life* describes her path from white privilege to racial healing, from ignorance to seeing the image of God in every face.

Anxious to Talk About It: Helping White Christians Talk Faithfully about Racism by Carolyn B. Helsel (2017)

When it comes to discussing racism, many white people are overwhelmed with anxiety, leading to a fight-or-flight response. In this book, pastor and Professor Carolyn Helsel draws on her successful experiences with white congregations to offer us tools to embrace and explore these anxious feelings and more faithfully engage these crucial conversations.






Seeking God's Design: Disciples' Quest for Unity and Wholeness by Richard Lowery et al (2019)

This recent collection of essays and reflections honors the 50th anniversary of "The Design," one of two key documents passed at the 1968 International Convention of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ). Along with the second document, known as "The Merger Agreement"—which brought together the African American National Christian Missionary Convention and the predominantly White International Convention—The Design helped a restructured church take concrete measures to heal the wounds of legally enshrined White supremacy. Of special interest in this compilation is Lawrence Burnley's essay "Through a Racial Lens: A View of the Social, Economic, and Political Context of the 1969 Merger Agreement."

Harriet Tubman: A Photographic Story of a Life by Kem Knapp Sawyer (2010)


This short biography tells the story of the famous abolitionist, from her childhood as a slave on a Maryland plantation, to her dramatic escape, to her tireless work as an organizer of the Underground Railroad. Like other titles in the "DK Biography" series, the book is filled with amazing archival photographs and is equally suitable for adult and teen readers.



All people deserve a chance to live sustainable lives. Sustainable lives lead to sustainable communities. This workshop will present an overview of how the Bridges Out of Poverty research is being implemented in the Building Bridges Initiative in Southeast Iowa and the successes being celebrated thus far.

Poverty is sometimes thought of as a shortage of financial resources. Research by Ruby Payne, PhD suggests there are nine categories of resources which impact poverty. This workshop will introduce the nine categories of resources needed for sustainable living and overview how the Building Bridges Initiative helps families strengthen those resources.

If you did not grow up in poverty, you may be unaware of the "hidden rules" that govern many aspects of life for the poor. This workshop will help you see and understand the hidden rules and how they are different for poor, middle class, and wealthy communities.

This workshop will help Churches redesign programs to better serve the people you work with and increase the likelihood of families moving from welfare to sustainable lifestyles.




