fter over a year of only on-line worship services, First Christian Church is about to embark on a new adventure... "hybrid worship"!

What is hybrid worship? It is sharing in worship together using 2 different platforms: online via Zoom AND in-person in the sanctuary. We have a lot of experience with in-person worship in the sanctuary. And, we now have over a year of experience with worship online via Zoom. But very soon we will try to bring these two together! One congregation – two ways of participating in worship at the same time.

Unless there is a spike in COVID 19 case numbers in Story County, we plan to begin hybrid worship on May 2, 9, and 16 with just a dozen extra people beyond the regular worship leaders and tech people. Please let me know if you want to be one of the dozen worshippers in

the first 3 weeks (maryjane@fccames.org) so I can email you instructions.

Then, on **PENTECOST SUNDAY**, **May 23**, we will begin the next level of Sunday morning participation with **as many as 50 people total** in the sanctuary for worship.

Zoom worship participants will notice some changes once there are other people in the sanctuary for worship. Worshippers in the sanctuary will notice many changes from how we gathered before the pandemic. There will be specific guidelines for those coming to the building. (Needing to reserve your seat ahead of time, parking only in the Fareway lot across Clark Ave., using only the "Bell Tower"/ramp door, wearing masks, keeping 6 feet of distance, partaking of pre-packaged communion, etc.) There is a summary of the protocols that follows this article. Please read it and ask me, a member of the Leadership Group (Vern Hawkins, Amy Kuehl, Sue Prins, Marv Prins, David Gregory, and Bob Logston) or an Elder if you have any questions. There will also be an orientation video to walk you through the process so you can decide whether worshipping in person or via Zoom is a better match for you.

What to Expect When You Return to Worship (In Person) at First Christian Church

The FCC Leadership Group's Plan to Resume In-Person Worship identifies three levels of re-opening that are based on guidelines established by the national Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

- For the last year we have been at <u>Level 1</u>, with the Sanctuary closed to all but the team conducting and recording worship.
- When we move to <u>Level 2</u> (currently planned for May) we will host worship gatherings of up to 50 people with social distancing, masks, and other safety measures still in place.
- Eventually, at <u>Level 3</u>, we hope to be able to relax limits on attendance as well as some safety measures. (This won't happen, however, until the majority of the population is vaccinated and viral transmission declines significantly.)

Remember, even after in-person worship has resumed, we will continue to offer online worship indefinitely—both live (via Zoom) and recorded.

If you do choose to attend in-person worship...

- During the week before worship, please RSVP to make sure a seat is available. Use the online form in the Weekly News Update (anytime) or call Liz in the office (before 1:45 PM Thursday).
- The morning of worship, please do a voluntary selfcheck at home. If you (or anyone in your household) is sick or has been exposed to COVID-19 in the last 14 days, please stay home and worship online!
- Plan to park only in the Fareway Supermarket lot, as FCC's west doors will remain locked. You'll enter and exit the church using the southeast "bell-tower" door (where the ramp is).
- Masks are required for all attendees except children under two years old. If you forget your mask, don't worry, we'll have a supply at the door (along with hand sanitizer).
- A Worship Attendant will greet you and escort you to your seat. We're using only 25% of our seating capacity to ensure a six-foot distance in all directions between individuals. Members of the same household or "bubble" can sit together. Children must always remain with their families, as there will be no nursery.
- Be prepared to spend roughly 50 minutes in the building, including ten minutes for gathering (doors will open at 10:20 AM), a 35-minute worship service, and five minutes for dismissal.
- To the extent possible, the sanctuary will be a "low touch" environment. Communion will be prepackaged; a drop-box will be available for offerings; items such as hymnals and Bibles have been removed from the pews. Feel free to bring your own Bible, or books/activities for your children. You're also welcome to bring your own communion if you prefer.
- At the close of worship, you'll be dismissed by a Worship Attendant. Until fellowship gatherings can resume safely, we ask everyone to exit the building promptly and to exchange any greetings outdoors, at safe distances from one another, and away from the ramp and building.
- High-touch areas in the sanctuary will be cleaned and disinfected between gatherings.

Moving to hybrid worship on Sunday mornings (some on Zoom; some in person in the sanctuary) is just the first step in the journey to a safe return to our building. This step does not change anything else at this time. The building will continue to be locked at all other times, and generally, there will be no groups, committees, or teams scheduling meetings or events in the building (with a very few exceptions). That will come in future steps, so stay tuned!

All who attended Worship on Sunday, April 18, received a wonderful <u>video message</u> from the Stewardship Committee, based on a reading from 2 Corinthians 9: 6-8.

Don Withers used the text to introduce what he called the *Law of Spiritual Generosity* that should guide us in our giving: As generosity flows out of us, God's abundance flows back in—sometimes when we least expect it, and in ways we never imagined! It's a process as natural as breathing out and breathing in. Don also told several heart-warming stories about what it means to be a truly *cheerful* giver in our everyday lives.

Sue Prins reminded us that, despite this crazy year of pandemic, "Here we are, still being church." And the spirit of generosity is one of the things that binds us together.

Vern Hawkins reminded viewers of the 25% shortfall in pledges this year and suggested that's it's never too late to submit a pledge. **Stacey Maifeld** added that those who have already pledged might consider increasing their pledges, if circumstances allow.

And finally, **Cynthia Gaunt** reminded viewers of the many opportunities to make financial gifts to the church, outside the formal pledge process—what we call in the annual budget our "faith factor."



Good Neighbor: Update

Dear Congregation:

Good Neighbor Emergency Assistance has adjusted to the challenges of the pandemic, giving out \$194,480 in 2020 to prevent homelessness and hunger!

Good Neighbor continues its mission "to provide emergency assistance (rent, utility, transportation and food) to our neighbors in Story County, in an atmosphere of dignity, comfort and encouragement." Director Lori Allen said that the organization's office, in FCC's former parsonage at 613 Clark Ave., is officially closed to the public. But she added: "People still come to our front porch if they need to fill out paper applications, to drop things off or to pick up food or gasoline vouchers."

She said that 95 to 98 percent of all applications since March 2020 have been done online. "This includes getting the documentation to us that we need. Most people snap a photo of their lease or bill or photo ID with their phone send it to our email," she said. "We can also gather information over the phone."

The GNEA director emphasized that financial need is ongoing. "In any given month, one-third to one-half of our applicants are new to Good Neighbor or have not used our services for the past five years," she said.

She also shared this helpful information:


- In 2020 Good Neighbor assisted 745 households with 1728 people, or about 11 percent of all people living at or near poverty in our Story County communities.
- Our agency helps families with children up to \$1000 per year, and adults only households up

to \$600 per year. In cases of extreme need, we can waive these limits. We count it success if households do not repeat or use the full allotment. We also count success when these allotments are all it takes to get households back on track financially.

Seeing and Believing

"I have seen the Lord."

Mary's simple statement, each time I read or hear it, grabs me and takes my breath away. After her emotional encounter with the resurrected Jesus, she shares the story with others, beginning, "I have seen the Lord."

This was not just something that happened to Mary. The New Testament shares that many people have seen the resurrected Jesus -- the apostles and then Thomas in a closed room, two disciples walking to Emmaus, and even the apostle Paul (an encounter which, ironically, left him temporarily blind).

And I'm convinced that our own faith is rooted in the times we have seen the resurrected Jesus -- precious moments when we have received radical forgiveness, gained wisdom beyond our capabilities, experienced comfort and hope in the depths of despair, or powerfully been embraced by God's love. Part of the way that our faith continues developing and growing is learning to recognize Jesus' presence in our lives and being able to describe those special moments like Mary did, "I have seen the Lord."

The more we do this, the more we can help others recognize Jesus' presence in their lives. As Disciples, we often do this by gathering frequently at the Lord's Table and repeating Jesus' invitation to others. We do it through prayer and Sunday School classes, through supporting one another and generously reaching out to people in need. As a region, we offer these opportunities each year through church camps and more.

During this Easter season, I hope you recognize a time when you have again been in the presence of Jesus and that you find words to tell someone else about it. If the words don't come easily, remember Mary, take a breath, and begin. "I have seen the Lord."

2021 Church Camp Changes

After a lot of prayer and discussion with our camp leadership, we have some updates for the 2021 camping season. We have been working hard to make camp a safe experience for campers, volunteers and staff. We are still developing our final Covid-19 protocols, but here are the things we know for sure right now. **Please read carefully!**

- This one is a big change... weeklong camps will be shortened by one day to allow for more training for volunteers. Volunteers will report on Sunday and training will be mandatory. Campers will report on Tuesday and be at camp until Saturday. Written information about these changes, as well as summer camp publicity packets, will be going out to churches this week. (Standing Rock Camp will not change due to the need for extra travel time.)
- Weeklong camp price will be reduced by \$30. Refunds will be issued for kids who
 have already registered for weeklong camps. Adjusted dates and prices will be
 reflected on camp publicity that will be mailed out. Shorter events are not
 affected.
- All camps will operate at a **50% capacity** this summer.
- Masks and social distancing will be required indoors for everyone except while eating or sleeping.
- Mask breaks will be possible outdoors, in the right circumstances, throughout the day.
- Camp is moving outside! All activities that can possibly be led outside will be, including moving the Dining Hall outside on nice days.
- Air filtration units are being built for spaces where programming will take place indoors (in case of inclement weather) and for when masks can't be used (dining hall if it's raining, and cabins at night).
- For activities when kids need to be unmasked, they will be in "activity pods", meaning the same pod will be together for all those unmasked activities. For example, campers will be grouped in a cabin group that will also be their table group.

The biggest reason for #1 is to give more adequate time to train volunteers for how to live out our weeks at camp with the Covid protocols in place. We want to make sure everyone is 100% sure of their role and the do's and don'ts before campers arrive. This will ensure a better camp experience for everyone. **This change in camp length is only in effect for 2021.**

Please pray for our decision makers as we try to do the best for everyone.




