Rooted and Grounded in Love:

Beginning with God

Fall Worship 2021 Rooted and Grounded in Love: Beginning with God

In August and the first Sunday in September, worship is centered on First Christian Church's Core Values:

- Genuinely accept, welcome and love everyone as Jesus did;
- > Connect people to God and to one another;
- Cultivate an environment where people grow in faith and discipleship;
- Celebrate everyone's gifts for ministry and encourage people as leaders;
- Minister in the community with God's healing love.

Last week we reflected on the second – Connect people to God and to one another. During Sunday's message I said, "People yearn for connection, and, if we didn't get that before the pandemic, hopefully we get it now. Hopefully we not only see the need for connection and relationship, we understand that the nature of that connection matters. People can connect based on hate. People can connect based on lies. People can connect in order to exclude others. People can connect in order to take more than their share of resources. People can connect in all manner of ways that diminish life. And there are plenty of opportunities to denigrate God's vision and intention by connecting in those ways as we have seen so clearly in these last few years, and heightened by the isolation of the last year and a half. Yet, we, as church, continue to commit our lives and our connections to one another on the foundation of love; on God."

In Ephesians 3:17 we hear the prayer "that Christ may dwell in our hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love." That prayer continues, "I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God." (Eph. 3:18-19) Then in the next chapter we read one of my favorite passages about how each are given gifts, and when each brings their gifts together to equip the saints for ministry, it builds up the body in Christ. "We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we must

grow up in every way... into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together...promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love." (Eph. 4:14 -16)

No matter what happens in culture, or politics, or the marketplace, or in "other" groups who may bear the name "Christian," we gather to hold ourselves to that higher standard Jesus showed us in both word and deed. Being rooted and grounded in the love of God in Christ Jesus, we can be a people who speak truth, build up, strengthen, heal, restore, care, and connect to the source of life – to God, who, by the way, is love.

This year our theme will be "Rooted and Grounded in Love." We will be using the Narrative Lectionary scriptures and resources, and we will begin at the beginning – with God. Our Fall focus is, "Beginning With God" exploring many stories in the Hebrew Bible (aka Old Testament). Here, in these sacred scriptures (that were the foundation of Jesus' faith), God speaks, provides, promises, reveals, sustains, calls, sees, lives among us, revives, demands justice, and breaks chains. In order to stay rooted and grounded in love in these turbulent times, we remember who God is and who God calls us to be as God's people. May we share in this journey together!

An Update from the FCC Trustees

The Trustees of First Christian Church continue to be grateful for the financial support of church members and friends.



Our current budget numbers do warrant some attention and concern. We continue to operate with a year-to-date deficit—that is, the cumulative difference between income and expenses. Fortunately, the deficit declined slightly between July 1 (-\$11,261) and August 1 (-\$11,251). Hopefully, increased giving—both pledged and unpledged—will continue to close this gap.

Typically, in the month of September, a letter is mailed from the church office to all those who have made financial gifts to the church during the current year, providing donors with a record of what they have given to date (through August 30). In the hope that this information is helpful, we will continue the practice this year. Please watch for this update letter, and consider prayerfully how you can best continue to support FCC's mission and ministries in the remaining months of 2021.

Designated Giving List

In addition to overseeing the church's annual budget, the Trustees work with FCC's General Board to maintain a list of purposes for which "designated gifts" may be given to the church. Typically, items on this list represent projects or programs that cannot be funded through the operating budget. They may be short-term, or very long-term. Over the years, this list has included programs like the LifeTree Café, as well as renovation projects in the Sanctuary, the Coffee House, Second Floor, and Fellowship Hall.

At the August 9th meeting of the Board, the Trustees recommended (and the Board approved) that the current Designated Giving List be revised. The list now includes the following three items: (1) Replacement of the doors at the West entrance; (2) Ongoing funding for the Ministry Coordinator for Children, Youth, and Families; and (3) Replacement and updating of external signage. By placing these projects/programs on the Designated Giving List, we signal that donations to support them are welcomed by the church. If you would like additional information about any of these initiatives, or would like to make a supplemental gift to help advance them, please contact one of the FCC Trustees.

Likewise, if you have questions, concerns, or suggestions regarding our work, feel free to reach out to any of the Trustees of First Christian Church.

July Conversational Surveys

o, how are people feeling about church these days?

In July, the Leadership Team and the Elders conducted a "conversational survey" of church members and friends, asking about their worship experiences and listening to their ideas about the future. An amazing 84 people responded, representing 57 households! The following is a quick summary of those responses.

Thirty-nine respondents attended worship in person this summer. All but four of them were comfortable with their experience. Of these, one person felt that Covid precautions were not strong enough, and three thought there were too many precautions. Seventy-two of us have worshipped by Zoom many expressing a desire that the Zoom option continue.

When we asked people about barriers to worship, 52 respondents felt they had indeed experienced barriers. Half of them (26) were concerned about their risk of exposure to Covid. The other half had personal issues such as transportation, childcare, work schedules, and personal plans. Seven people saw the mask requirement as a barrier (believing masks to be unnecessary), and two expressed frustration with the RSVP process. Twenty-seven people stated they had not experienced barriers to worship.

The survey asked which safety precautions are important to our members and friends. Forty-five respondents believe that masks are important, 29 talked about the importance of distancing, and 15 mentioned vaccinations and/or boosters. Others mentioned pre-packaged communion, no hand shaking, and limiting time indoors.

When we asked about returning to in-person worship, 65 respondents felt positive about returning, despite concerns about seniors, children, and immune-compromised folks. Twelve people felt

negatively about returning to in-person worship. Ten of these folks do not feel safe with current precautions and two felt that precautions were excessive. Seven of us were undecided or did not respond to this question.

Finally, we asked people to respond to a proposed scenario for opening back up with fewer restrictions, but keeping masks. Seventy-five of us liked the scenario, with a variety of commentary. Six were generally negative toward the proposed scenario, four of them believing that the precautions were excessive, and two that the precautions were not strict enough.

True to form, our FCC community remains a diverse, but committed, bunch!

The Leadership Group is grateful to all who participated in this survey, and will take these findings to heart as we continue to plan the inperson worship experience at First Christian Church.

Changes to In-Person Worship

hanks to the Elders and everyone who shared their thoughts and experiences through a conversational survey recently. We were pleased to receive 84 responses representing 57 households. The Leadership Group is using this helpful information along with COVID-related data from Story County to make the best possible decisions regarding protocols for Sunday morning worship.

At this point the Leadership Group has decided to make changes to in-person worship that we hope

will enhance the in-person experience without compromising safety:

- You will no longer need to RSVP. Just grab your mask and show up!
- While seating will continue to be socially distanced, you can choose to sit in any available seat with anyone in your household or "bubble."
- Although masks will still be required during worship and while in the building, you can enjoy outdoor fellowship after worship, where masks will be optional. Fellowship will be on the shady north side of the building. Lawn chairs and cold water will be provided. (Feel free to bring your own coffee or other beverage.)

These were some of the most popular changes in the scenario that was discussed during the conversational survey. It is important for other safety precautions to remain in place until Story County numbers improve. These include:

- Masks will still be required for all attendees except children under two years old while indoors. (Disposable masks are available if you forget.) This is still the best way to protect one another.
- Socially distanced seating will be maintained, but with more choice regarding where and with whom you sit.
- Continue to park in the Fareway Supermarket lot and enter and the church using the southeast "bell-tower" door where the ramp is. (When exiting the building those staying for fellowship may exit through the north door opening into the playground area.)
- We'll continue to provide a no-touch offering box and pre-packaged communion.
- We'll continue to limit the time spent indoors to 40-50 minutes (including gathering and exiting).
- ZOOM Worship will continue!

As always, please stay home if you are feeling unwell.

LEADERSHIP POSITIONS AT FCC



The Board Chair: Presides at all meetings of the General Board and Congregation and performs other duties normally associated with the office of the Chair. *Thick skin, can stay on task, well grounded, internal strength, humor, spiritual maturity, enthusiasm, good at asking the right questions, diplomacy skills, available and responsive.*

The Vice-Chair: Supports the Chair, presides in the Chair's absence, and serves as Chair of the Personnel Committee. *Thick skin, can stay on task, well grounded, internal strength, humor, spiritual maturity, enthusiasm, good at asking the right questions, diplomacy skills, available and responsive.*

The Secretary: Keeps Minutes of all meetings of the General Board and Congregation and provides them for review and approval by the General Board. *Good listener, organized, detail oriented, focused.*

The Treasurer: Records expenses of the Congregation, provides written reports of income and expenses to the General Board and signs checks. *Detail oriented, comfortable with numbers, self-motivated, problem solvers.*

The Financial Secretary: Records and deposits all income, tracks individual pledges and reports to the General Board. *Detail oriented, comfortable with numbers, self-motivated, problem solvers.*

The Property Committee Chair: Recruits committee members, leads the Property Committee, coordinates its work with the Trustees, and reports to the General Board. *Mission-focused, works well with others.*

The Nominations Committee Chair: Leads the Nominations Committee and reports to the General Board. Sees the big picture, empowers people, sees gifts of others, works well with a team.

Stewardship Committee Chair: Recruits committee members, leads the Stewardship Committee, coordinates its work with the Trustees, and reports to the General Board. *Leads an intentional process, enthusiasm for Stewardship as it applies to the whole of life.*

Elders: Seek the greatest spiritual growth of all members, preside at communion, and share with the minister(s) in pastoral responsibilities. *Handles tough questions gracefully, leadership skills, ability to listen without judgement, calm during conflict or anxious situations, mature, respect for confidentiality, works well with others, openhearted, compassionate, slow to anger, "has seen it all."*

Deacons: Are responsible for a ministry of service, most visibly known in communion and baptism. *Caring, serves with a sense of purpose, flexible.*

Trustees: Serve as legal agents for the Congregation and present an annual Congregational budget to the General Board in advance of the annual meeting of the Congregation. *Seasoned individuals, may have served in other positions previously, sees big picture, does due diligence.*

Council of Ministries Moderator: Leads the Council of Ministries and reports to the General Board. *Team-oriented, organized, skilled listener, spiritually mature, encouraging, understands FCC Core Values and Future Story.*

Delegates (Ames Ecumenical Housing, Emergency Residence, Good Neighbor, and Food at First): Represent the Congregation on Boards of these organizations. *Passionate about the organizations' programs and their impact in the community.*

ttention parents and caring adults of FCC! Each year you are invited and encouraged to attend a training and discussion session on how we keep our children safe while they are in the care of the church.


Everyone who works with children in any way is required to attend the session and to sign a statement indicating agreement with and willingness to follow our policies.

That same weekend, many women will gather for the annual Upper Midwest Fall Women's Retreat. After holding an online retreat in September 2020, the


coordinators are optimistic that many will gather at Lake Koronis Assembly Grounds in person.




