CROP HUNGER WALK



FCC has a CROP Walk Team!

This year, the Ames Area CROP Walk will be held on Sunday, October 10, and once again First Christian Church has assembled a crackerjack team of walkers to help raise money to alleviate hunger, both locally and around the world. Members of this year's FCC CROP Walk Team include: Pastor Mary Jane Button-Harrison; Cynthia Gaunt; Mary and David Gregory (Team Co-Chairs); Vern Hawkins; Stacey Maifeld; Anleah, Tiffany, and Scott Walker; Melissa Webb; and Don Withers. Melissa is also rounding up some FCC children and youth to join the team, and is planning some cool, CROP-related activities for them.

After last year's "virtual" event, this year's CROP Walk will be a *hybrid* event. Groups and individuals can choose to join the community walk on the afternoon of Sunday, October 10, or can plan their own walks as they did in 2020. Either way, the "walking" part of CROP Walk has always been a symbolic gesture, to honor people around the world who *must* walk—every day, and often for great distances—to secure food and water.

As always, you can support CROP Walk by sponsoring any one of these FCC walkers, or simply donating to the FCC Team. We have set a team goal of \$2,000 and are dedicated to meeting or surpassing that goal, as we did last year!

Money raised through CROP Walk helps to fund food programs sponsored around the world by Church World Service. In addition, 25% of the total amount raised by Ames-area walkers is earmarked for *local*

GLOBALLY...

75% of the money raised by the Ames Area CROP Walk goes to Church World Service (CWS), a cooperative ministry of 37 Christian denominations and communions, providing sustainable self-help, development, disaster relief, and refugee assistance around the world. The CWS mission is to eradicate hunger and poverty and to promote peace and justice at the national and international level through collaboration with partners abroad and in the US.

LOCALLY...

Greetings from the Hansons and the people of the Evangelical and Reformed Church of Honduras!

Greetings from the local church in Río Chiquito!

e previously served as mission coworkers in Honduras from 2004-2009, and now we have been invited to return following two devastating hurricanes hitting Honduras in November of 2020. We are excited and humbled to be invited to return to Honduras to serve a nation and people we had come to love, a country struggling with abject poverty, government corruption, gang violence and the effects of the COVID pandemic.

This time our placement is in the department of Omoa, on the northwest part of Honduras. Río Chiquito is a small *pueblo* of around 4000 people, only 15 kilometers from the Guatemalan border. In some ways it reminds of us of small town lowa, with friendly neighbors, and a small grocery that sells primarily beans and rice, chicken, oil, chips, and really good ice cream bars! Neighbors drop by to give us plantains, avocados, and tripe soup. We live a few miles from beautiful beaches and mountains, eat delicious fresh seafood, and have the blessing of air conditioning in our bedroom for days when the heat is overwhelming.

We were called to health care ministry, and have provided some "mini-brigades" of simple health care advice and over-the-counter medications to members of the local church and to people still living in temporary shelter following the hurricanes. This usually consists of giving people Tylenol, antibiotic ointment, anti-fungal creams, or medicines for stomach upset. But, we always encounter a few people with more complicated medical problems, needing more advanced care. We've also provided

health information classes to members of the church including information on COVID and the importance of vaccination, social distancing and masks. Due to a generous gift we also were able to provide masks to all the members of the church.

We are also working with local elementary school children who are behind in reading and math as the result of the pandemic and teaching an English class to junior high youth. Schools have been closed for over a year, and there is no opportunity for Zoom classes here; even the schools don't have computers.

We're also working with the local church on a project to begin recycling in the community. When we arrived we learned there was no service for garbage pick-up in Río Chiquito. Many people burn their garbage, including plastics which create toxic smoke in their back yards. We have visited Invema, a large recycling center in the metropolitan San Pedro Sula. We are working with the local pastor on a more coordinated response to managing garbage in the community, working with Invema on recycling, planning community education and networking with existing small scale recyclers.



Moment of Mission

Years ago, while walking to my predominately white middle school, I witnessed something that has been preserved in my memory for decades. Several yards ahead of me was Josette; a girl I barely knew. Although her skin color was the same as the majority of the students, her appearance was drastically different from other female classmates. She wore long dark skirts, sweaters, heavy black brogans, and often kept a scarf tied around her head (not a burka or hijab). As we approached the schoolyard, I could hear a few boys yelling at her.

As I got closer, I heard these words: "Go back to where you came from you nasty Jew!", "You're ugly!", "Nobody wants you here!" There were other unkind statements. Even though I didn't know what a Jew was, I knew that their actions were wrong. I looked ahead, pretending to not hear or see anything, and went straight to my class.

The prophet Isaiah admonishes God's beloved in Isaiah 56:1 to, "Maintain justice and do what is right, for soon my salvation will come, and my deliverance be revealed." Frequently, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. reminds us that "The time is always ripe to do what is right". The message is clear: We are to do what is right with the time God has given us.

It is a precious gift like the gift of reconciliation through Christ Jesus. How I wish I had the courage to take time to do what was right on Josette's behalf. The Ministry of Reconciliation offers each of us the opportunity to "do what is right". Your giving supports diversity & inclusion through leadership development in our colleges, provides grants to ministry partners to further the work of anti-racism. It creates opportunities to heal our brokenness by promoting relationship-building through our One Bag of Tea program, and by equipping congregations to be advocates for racial justice in their communities.

Yes! The time is always ripe to reveal God's justice. Thank you in advance for your generosity to Reconciliation Ministry!





An Advent Devotional Preview...




Traveling with our Ancestors Advent Devotional


