### Woven Into a Tapestry of Love

dvent is the season that prepares us for Christmas. It is the waiting, watching, anticipating, reflecting time that is meant to give space to empty ourselves and open our heart and lives to receive "a Savior who is Christ the Lord." (Mt. 2:11) We are reminded how there was "no place in the inn" and we want to make sure there is a place for the Christ-child in us. Each Sunday of Advent we will light the Advent candles as we go from Hope to Peace to Joy to Love. Once again, Love is the crown; the greatest gift; that which makes us known as disciples; the greatest commandment; God in the flesh – with us – Emmanuel.

In 1885 a Christmas poem by Christina Rosetti was first published. That poem has since been made into a Christmas Carol:

Love came down at Christmas, love all lovely, love divine. Love was born at Christmas – star and angels gave the sign Love shall be our token, love be yours and love be mine, Love to God and neighbor, love for pray'r and gift and sign.

In the fall we went back to the basics of Christian living as we explored "one another" passages in the New Testament letters (see article on "One Another-ing" below). This Advent we will go back to the basics as we explore several of the stories of the first Christmas. These birth stories are only found in two places in the New Testament – the gospels of Matthew and Luke. And those stories are quite different from one another. This Advent we will hear the story of Joseph and his dream; of Zechariah and his prophecy; Mary and her song; and, of course, the angels, the manger, and the shepherds will have their part. And each Sunday during the prayer time we will sing, "While we are waiting, come." While we are waiting for Christmas, come, share in worship as we prepare room for Christ to be born in us and so we can sing, "Joy to the World, the Lord is come!"

### Woven Into a Tapestry of Love: One Another-ing

In the August issue of The Call, I wrote an introduction to this year's theme, "Woven Into a Tapestry of Love," and our fall sermon series on the "One Another" passages in the New Testament letters. There I wrote: "From the beginning, Christians were called to grow in and live out their faith in community. That is why Paul used the image of the body. A foot separated from the body cannot live. With one another, however, we learn and practice living our faith in our day to day lives. The letters were written to those first churches who had to navigate what it meant to be followers of Jesus amid the rules and norms of the Roman Empire and Caesar. One of the unique marks of the Christian churches as distinct from society is the radical equality of all members. Those with more money and prestige were not considered more worthy in the church, yet the habits and customs people learn outside the church can have an influence on behavior. The "one another" sayings are a corrective. The one another passages help us, as Paul says, "have minds confident and at rest, focused on Christ, God's great mystery.""

On Kick-Off Sunday, September 11, we started in *Romans* with **"Welcome One Another."** Though we may think we don't need others, in fact, we do. And staying true to the teachings and call of Jesus requires the strength and focus we get when we welcome one another as Christ has welcomed us. September 18, we moved to *Galatians* with **"Serve One Another."** Christ came to set us free, so we reflected on just what freedom from a faith standpoint is. Freedom is not an opportunity for self-indulgence, rather, in freedom in Christ is freedom from being bound to our own selfish desires or fears, and instead, being bound to others in love.

September 25, we moved to *Ephesians* with "Forgive One Another." On that day we remembered those saints of the church, mentors in the faith, who taught us to tell the truth, to deal with our anger in healthy ways, to work and be honest, to share with those in need, to speak in ways that build others up, and to be kind, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you. On World Communion Sunday, October 2, we moved to 1 *Corinthians* with "Wait for One Another." When we gather together, we must realize that we come from different experiences, different economic and social status, different stations in life, and so we wait for one

another, having patience, generosity, compassion, and unity in the midst of those differences.

October 9, we moved to *Philippians* with "Look Out for One Another." Living "Christianly" as one commentator puts it, we don't just look out for number one. Rather, we take our cue from Jesus who was humble and understood that he was called to do that which would serve God's purposes and the good of all. October 16, we moved to Colossians with "Teach and Admonish One Another." Deb Lewis shared how all of us in the faith community are teachers to and learners from one another, and to admonish one another – meaning to advise or warn one another in all wisdom - to help one another on our faith journey. October 23 moved to 1 Thessalonians with "Encourage and Build Up One Another." Regional Minister, Rev. Josh Patty shared from his experience about how it is that those in church provide encouragement, and, how that encouragement can come to us in a variety of ways, sometimes unexpectedly.

October 30, we moved to Hebrews with "Provoke One Another." We live in times when we know and experience what it means to be provoked, but usually in a bad way, and in those instances, we may regret our actions. In Hebrews we are commended to provoke one another to love and good deeds instead. November 6, we moved to James with "Confess to and Pray for One Another." Confession is good for the soul. However, it needs to be done and received in a manner that is surrounded by prayer and allows God's grace to flow bringing healing and wholeness of body, mind, and spirit. November 13, we moved to 1 Peter with "Be Hospitable to One Another." In the community of faith, hospitality is a two-way street. We offer one another hospitality. We are both guests and hosts at the same time and share the responsibility for hospitality. November 20, we moved to I John with the crown on this series - "Love One Another." Jesus says his disciples will be known by their love for one another. Stewardship Team chair, Don Withers shared a message on Stewardship Dedication Sunday about how, in Christ, it is our nature to be generous; it is our nature to give cheerfully. And as we give; as we love; we have faith that love grows and spreads just as God intended.

### Message from the Trustees

Let the peace of Christ rule in your heart, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful (Colossians 3:15). As the holiday season approaches there is much to be thankful for. We are thankful for your faithfulness.

At the end of October, the Asset and Profit and Loss statements reflected a favorable trend in the number of Written Pledge receipts. *Profit and Loss:* The Year- to-Date (YTD) 2022 Actual written pledge amount of \$142,608 exceeded the Budget by Month anticipated amount of \$141,667.00. We are trending in the right direction.

The Net Income for the month of October was \$7,106.00! In addition, the YTD September Negative Income amount was \$26,389.00. In October, the YTD Net Income decreased to the lesser negative amount of \$19,283.00. A decrease of \$7,106.00!

From September 30 to October 31,2022, FCC's total *Christian Church Foundation* amounts have decreased from \$212,748.44 to \$196,986.27, a loss of \$15,762.17. The bear market persists.

#### FCC's Line-Item Budget for 2023

The Proposed 2023 Line-Item budget appear elsewhere in the *Call* and will be voted on after Sunday worship, on December 11, 2022.

### Annual Congregational Meeting December 11

Each year, on the second Sunday of December, First Christian Church holds its Annual Congregational Meeting immediately after worship to approve the next year's budget and elect the next year's leaders. This year is no exception!

In late October you received a letter from the Stewardship Committee that included a narrative budget, and in this edition of The Call there is a summary of the proposed line item budget for 2023. Also in this edition of The Call you will find a slate of the proposed church leaders for 2023. These two items – the budget and the slate of church leaders – are the core of what we will discuss at the Annual Congregational Meeting.

On December 11, immediately after the conclusion of the hybrid worship service, we will remain in the Sanctuary and on Zoom to discuss and approve the budget and slate of church leaders. Details about how the vote will be taken and recorded will also be included in the December 8 Weekly Update.

We are doing things a little differently during

this time of COVID-19, but we are continuing our work to serve your individual needs, the needs of the collective congregation, and the needs of our neighbors in the wider community. Thank you for your continued involvement and support!

**Green Team Challenge:** Choose a room in your home and make one change to help reduce your carbon footprint. Report what change you made to the Green Team. Besides helping our beautiful planet, your name will be added to a drawing for a prize.

Need ideas for what you can change? The Green Team came up with 10 suggestions.

- 1. Do you use liquid hand soap? Instead of buying a new battle, buy refill bottles. Maybe use an attractive soap dispenser.
- 2. Try shampoo bars. Stacey does and she doesn't notice a difference.
- 3. Compost food scraps.
- 4. Reduce the amount of laundry soap you use. We use way too much! Here's a simple table of recommended amounts.

	Standard Washer	HE Washer
2X Liquid Detergent	2 tbsp	2 tsp
Soft Water	1 ½ tbsp	1 ½ tsp
Powder Detergent	<sup>1</sup> / <sub>4</sub> - 1/3 cup	2 tbsp
Premeasured Pack	1 pack	1 pack

- 5. Use Wool dryer balls in the clothes drier instead of drier sheets or hang up your clothes to dry.
- 6. Recycle clothes at one of the various second-hand stores.
- 7. Use only Green/Eco friendly cleaning products such as vinegar and water and baking soda. Don't mix vinegar and baking soda together.
- 8. Instead of turning up the thermostat in the winter, layer your clothes and use lap blankets.
- 9. Set up a recycling area in your home for food scraps, glass, and recyclable drink bottles and cans. Use the area!
- 10. Work with the sun by using your window coverings.

There are many different things you can do to reduce your carbon footprint. Share what you are doing. We all need to work together one step at a time. Our children and grandchildren are depending on us.




