Week of Compassion is the relief, refugee, and development mission fund of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada. For nearly 80 years, Week of Compassion has pursued its mission, working with partners to alleviate suffering throughout the world, toward the vision of a world where God's people transform suffering into hope.

This past year has continued to witness the ravages of COVID-19 across the globe. War in Ukraine persists, and recovery for that nation's people will be extensive and long-lasting. Communities from Kentucky to Puerto Rico to Newfoundland are in the throes of long-term recovery from tornadoes, massive floods, and hurricanes. Wildfires continue to imperil western U.S. states and Canadian provinces, and drought affects the world's farmers, ranchers, and tribal communities alike. Unfathomable floods in Pakistan and the Philippines have left indelible images of destruction and tragedy, while the simplest needs—nutrition, shelter, work—seem out of reach for far too many people in far too many places.

In the middle of it all, Week of Compassion calls on God's mercy and speaks boldly of the Divine goodness made new each day. When it seems that tragedy and hardship is all that rises up, the people of God trust in a holy word, and proclaim with their work, their witness, and their generous

Terri Hord Owens has often said, "When Week of Compassion is there, the whole church is there"—to bring immediate relief and long-term recovery after disasters; equip churches and leaders for disaster preparedness; respond to assist refugees; and support global development projects that empower communities.

As Disciples, we gather at the table of thanksgiving, where we remember Christ's very life poured out lavishly for everyone without exception. This abundance and blessing is what we receive, who we are, and who God calls us to be. In the midst of pain that seems too great and challenges that seem too many, God's great faithfulness remains, and we rise up anew, again and again, to give, serve, and live with compassionate generosity. Thank you for your ongoing support and partnership, throughout the year, throughout the world.

An Update from the Trustees

Once again, the Trustees wish to thank all those who helped fund the church's operating budget in 2022, through pledges and unpledged gifts. We are grateful as well to those who have pledged to support the 2023 budget. Please remember that it is not too late to submit your 2023 pledge. Simply return your pledge card through the offering plate or U.S. mail or contact Liz Collazo in the church office for assistance. To date, written pledges totaling \$146,495 have been submitted to the church. This is less than the hoped-for pledge total of \$181,000. We thank you in advance for helping to meet this goal.

As we close the 2022 budget year, we are disheartened to report that we ended the year with a deficit of \$38,310—that is, spending exceeded income by this amount. Expenses were actually lower than what had been budgeted (by almost \$17,000), but income was also much lower (by almost \$55,000), thus producing this record deficit. As we have stated in the past, we have sufficient money in the General Fund to cover this shortfall, but deficit spending of this magnitude needs to be an exception, and not the rule. We ended the previous year (2021) with a deficit of \$14,000, so this recurrence of deficit spending is clearly of concern.

The Trustees, who meet monthly, will make their highest priority this year to explore ways to both reduce expenses at First Christian Church and to identify new sources of income. If you, as a congregant or friend, have advice for us in this regard, please reach out to one of the 2023 Trustees listed below. In the meantime, if you have the financial resources, please prayerfully consider making a special gift to the church, beyond your planned 2023 giving, specifically to help address the 2022 deficit (and to strengthen the General Fund). As always, we will keep you informed through regular updates in The Call.

A COVID Update from the FCC Leadership Group

As we enter a new year, the Leadership Group would like to share this update with congregants and friends of First Christian Church. First, our membership has changed to include leaders elected in our recent congregational meeting. Those now serving on the Leadership Group include Pastor Mary Jane Button-Harrison, Roger Bertelsen (General Board), David Gregory (Trustees), Vern Hawkins (Personnel), Deb Lewis (Council of Ministries), and Sue Prins (Elders). The mission of the group, however, remains the same: to prayerfully “follow the science” in developing plans to keep the FCC community both physically safe and spiritually connected during public health crises. To that end, we continue to monitor data regarding COVID-19 in Story County, as well as guidelines set forth by public health specialists.

Since March of 2022, Leadership has determined that FCC will observe the following guideline from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC): As long as Story County remains at

a Low or Medium risk level (based on CDC standards and definitions), safety protocols at First Christian Church will continue to be relaxed. If Story County’s risk level should increase to High, more stringent safety protocols will be re-introduced. This continues to be our position in 2023.

Leadership would also like to recommend that you read the following article in the January 9, 2023 issue of the *Ames Tribune* on [XBB.1.5, the latest COVID-19 variant](#). XBB.1.5 is believed to be the most transmissible version of the COVID virus yet—five times more contagious than the earlier omicron variant. As the new variant is expected to hit Iowa in the coming weeks, infectious disease specialists are urging Iowans to get the bivalent COVID-19 booster shot as soon as possible. Iowa Department of Health specialists are particularly concerned that “fewer than 1 in 6 Iowans have received a bivalent booster dose, the shot designed to protect from omicron strains of COVID-19.”

If you are concerned or uncertain about your own immunity or current vaccination/booster status (or concerned about a family member or loved one) please be sure to consult with your doctor or healthcare provider, especially in light of the more virulent strains of COVID-19 that are emerging. And as always, if you are feeling unwell during this time of COVID, flu, and other respiratory illnesses, please choose Zoom as an alternative to in-person worship and other church gatherings. Let’s continue to keep ourselves—and each other—healthy and well!

In December, we collected mittens, scarves and money for kids aging out of foster care and to help those who have the greatest needs. The Christmas season always opens our hearts to our neighbors who are struggling. Our Mother Earth is struggling too! What can we do? RECYCLE! The Green Team has some ideas.

- Do you get unused greeting cards or unused Christmas cards in the mail from a nonprofit organization? The Green Team will be setting up a box for you to put these cards with envelopes in so they can be recycled. Team members will deliver them to Overflow to be sold to help the Boys and Girls Club.
- Nice used clothing in good condition can be donated to Overflow, Affordables in Story City (supports Bethany Life), and Clothing That Works at the Collegiate Methodist Church Annex (adult clothing), besides Goodwill and Salvation Army.
- Do you have old jeans that are really in bad shape? They can be recycled! They can be mailed free of charge to Zappos for Good (<https://bluejeansgogreen.org/recycle-denim/> for more information). The Green Team will discuss this recycling option.
- Old shoes cluttering your closet? There are several options for recycling old shoes. Nike will recycle tennis/running shoes and the Ames Noon Kiwanis will be having a shoe drive later this year.
- Old sweaters with broken zippers or are no longer useable are being made into mittens by Happy Harmony Mittens in Nevada, Iowa. See their Facebook page for more information.
- Old furniture in good shape can be donated to Habitat for Humanity (<https://hfhci.org/donate/> for more information). First Christian was involved in the creation of the Habitat for Humanity of Central Iowa.
- The City of Ames recycling Programs:
 - Rummage RAMPage 2023 will be Friday, July 28, through Saturday, Aug. 5 for furniture, small working electronics, flat screen TVs, kitchenware, houseware, house plants, and sporting equipment (<https://www.cityofames.org/living/rummage-rampage> for more information).
 - Glass Recycling – glass dumpsters located at Fareway stores, HyVee Stores, and 420 E 2nd St.
 - Food Waste – Compost dumpster located at 420 E 2nd St.

Climate Change Corner

State of The Climate

The world is in a climate emergency – “a code red for humanity” according to the UN Secretary-General. The concentration of greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions in the atmosphere is wreaking havoc across the world and threatening lives, economies, health and food. The world is far from securing a global temperature rise to below 2°C as promised in the Paris Agreement. With a baseline in 1990, some countries are emitting more, some the same and others are emitting less.

What can we do? Here are a few ideas.

- Take the Green Team Challenge and maybe make more than one change.
- Recycle cellphones and other devices at the Story County Conservation Center and other Story County Offices.

A critical component in smartphones and other devices is a substance called coltan. 80% of the world's supply of coltan is found directly in the center of gorilla habitat in the Congo. Mineral mining for smartphones has fueled bloody conflicts and gorilla habitat loss. The best way you can reduce this impact is recycling old smartphones and limiting unnecessary upgrades to a new device.



Story County Conservation has partnered with the Blank Park Zoo and ECO-CELL to recycle your old smartphones (and ipads, tablets, mp3 players, handheld gaming systems, chargers, and device accessories). ECO-CELL is a nonprofit which reclaims the precious minerals found inside these devices. Recycling these items helps save endangered gorillas by reducing the demand for coltan while 100% of the proceeds from this project go directly towards reforestation in the Congo and care for rescued gorillas.



- Support legislative bills that help to fight Climate Change by writing to your Representatives and Senators.

Summer Camp 2023

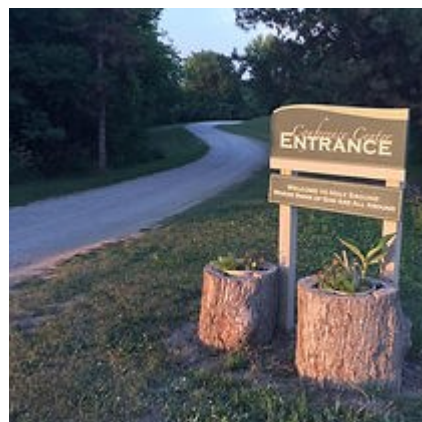

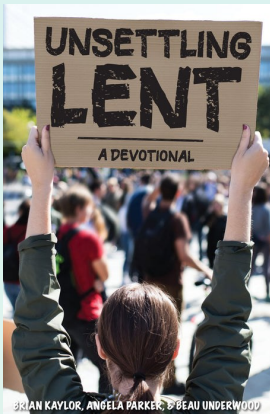

U*nsettling Lent* is not your ordinary Lenten devotional. That's a good thing, given the ways Lent's radical meaning has been diminished by our culture's false promotion of religious complacency. By connecting the biblical story to present-day realities, it invites Christians to make Lent a season of solidarity and justice-seeking. In contrast to devotionals emphasizing personal spirituality and interior transformations, *Unsettling Lent* emphasizes the public implications and communal aspects of self-denial, sacrificial love, and confrontations with power. Followers of Jesus are invited to journey to the cross in a more faithful way that promises to harness the power of this season for the renewal of ourselves, our churches, and our world.

Brian Kaylor is a Baptist pastor with a Ph.D in Political Communication. He serves as President & Editor-in-Chief of *Word&Way*, a Christian publication founded in 1896. Angela Parker is an Assistant Professor of New Testament and Greek at Mercer University's McAfee School of Theology. She is also an ordained missionary Baptist pastor. Beau Underwood is senior pastor of Allisonville Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Indianapolis.

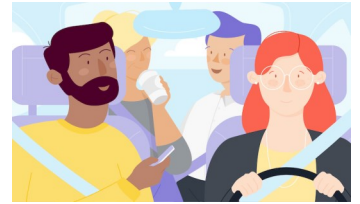

4. Proof of Story County residency

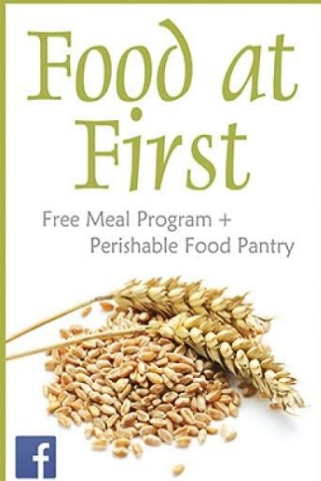
