

How might Jesus' instructions – take up your cross, be last and servant of all, help us prepare to change? How might that voice coming through the clouds saying "Listen" help us prepare to change?"

May this season of Lent prepare us to change in ways that bring resurrection life to and beyond FCC!

An Update from the Trustees...

"Bride's Room Renovation" is added to the Designated Giving List

t their meeting on February 13, 2023, members of the FCC General Board voted unanimously to revise the church's Designated Giving List, acting on a proposal received from the FCC Trustees. In this issue of *The Call*, the Trustees would like to remind FCC members and friends about the existence—and the importance—of this list.

The church's Gift Policy, which has been in place since 2013, states that:

"The Board shall maintain a list of purposes for which designated gifts may be accepted, consistent with the current ministries and missions of the church. This list shall be known as the Designated Giving List."

Periodically, the Trustees review the Designated Giving List, discuss ways in which it might be revised (in consultation with the pastor and other church leaders), develop a proposal, and submit it to the General Board. This week, the Trustees recommended to the Board that funding for a modest renovation of the Bride's Room be added to this list.

The Bride's Room, on the church's lower level and connected by stairs to the Sanctuary, was unused by the congregation throughout the pandemic, serving instead as a much-needed storage space for Food at First. Though the room has been cared for, it shows the normal wear and tear of many years of prior use. To create a pleasant and welcoming environment, and in consultation with the Property Committee, the Trustees have proposed a fresh coat of paint, new carpet (probably in the form of carpet tiles), and some new furnishings to supplement those that can be transferred from other parts of the building. If you have a fondness for the Bride's Room and would

like to assist in funding these improvements, please earmark a donation for this purpose. The Trustees—and the next generation of FCC brides—will greatly appreciate your generosity!

Four additional projects remain on the Designated Giving List, representing either short or long-term priorities for First Christian Church. The complete list now includes:

- 1) Help fund a Ministry Coordinator for Children, Youth, and Families
- 2) Replace and update outdoor signage
- 3) Replace and update exterior doors
- 4) Help fund special projects and programs facilitated by the FCC Council of Ministries
- 5) Help fund a modest renovation of the Bride's Room (paint, carpet, selected furnishings)

As you can see, our current list includes both "brick-and-mortar" projects and programmatic initiatives.

Thank you again if you have ever contemplated a "special" gift to FCC, above and beyond those "regular" donations that support the General Fund and the church's operating budget. If your special gift is *undesignated* (an option that is always welcomed), the Trustees will do their best to ensure that your gift is managed wisely. If you prefer to make a targeted gift, we hope the revised Designated Giving List provides you with both guidance and inspiration.



Do We Really Mean That?

ur General Minister, Rev. Terri Hord Owens, frequently encourages us to "be the church we say we are." This is a reminder that some things take more work to make a reality. These words came to mind when I read an online article by Rev. Cindy Halvorson from a ministry consulting and support organization in Minnesota. In "Five Themes LeaderWise Hears And Why They Are the Death of the Church," she names one I have heard from countless congregations over more than 20 years of ministry: "We are a welcoming church."

I have never doubted the sincerity of this sentiment, but I have wondered if visitors actually experience this the way people in the 'welcoming church' imagine. Halvorson challenges us, "This statement raises questions: Welcoming to whom? Welcoming how? Occasionally, congregations are willing to welcome people who will do things the way they do things and who will agree with them on their thoughts and beliefs without questions or challenges. They rarely understand that their tight-knit

congregation that has been worshiping together for years, which they see as a strength, can feel closed and impenetrable to people outside of it."

As much as we may want to welcome people – and as much as we recognize that not everyone will agree with us, it certainly is easier to connect with people who are quickly comfortable with how our church does things. When was the last time we imagined what it might be like for a visitor to worship with us for the first time? Or how a visitor might be connected to our congregation beyond worship – to join a class or group, to serve with us, to make a financial gift, to become a member? What specific things do we do to welcome people and invite them to return? What else should we do "to be the church we say we are."

Such questions could strengthen other key aspects of our congregational identities too. What are we doing to value families and children in our congregation? How are we serving others in Christ's name in our community and beyond? We can celebrate the concrete steps we have taken to make these things a reality and then figure out what other things we should do to better live out who we say we are and who we want to be as church.



Unsettling Lent: A Lenten Devotional by Brian Kaylor, Angela Parker, and Beau Underwood

nsettling Lent is not your ordinary Lenten devotional. That's a good thing, given the

ways Lent's radical meaning has been diminished by our culture's false promotion of religious complacency. By connecting the biblical story to present-day realities, it invites Christians to make Lent a season of solidarity and justice-seeking. In contrast to devotionals emphasizing personal spirituality and interior transformations, *Unsettling Lent* emphasizes the public implications and communal aspects of self-denial, sacrificial love, and confrontations with power. Followers of Jesus are invited to journey to the cross in a more faithful way that promises to harness the power of this season for the renewal of ourselves, our churches, and our world.

Brian Kaylor is a Baptist pastor with a Ph.D in Political Communication. He serves as President & Editor-in-Chief of Word&Way, a Christian publication founded in 1896. Angela Parker is an Assistant Professor of New Testament and Greek at Mercer University's McAfee School of Theology. She is also an ordained missionary Baptist pastor. Beau Underwood is senior pastor of Allisonville Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Indianapolis.




