

An Update from the Trustees

onitoring the 2023 budget and implementing safeguards: In September, we experienced another month of deficit spending, with expenditures exceeding income by \$11,651. Unfortunately, this has reduced our year-to-date (YTD) net income to \$212. In practical terms, this means that the unexpected gift of \$40,007 we received in April to replenish the General Fund has been spent. This is sobering news, but we continue to hope and pray that generous giving in the final quarter of the year will improve our financial outlook.

We should reiterate here that the General Fund is essentially the church's checking accountseparate and distinct from our savings account and investments. Like the personal checking accounts many of us maintain, this account supports our operating budget. Most of our income is deposited in this account (unless it is designated for purposes other than the budget), and monthly bills are paid from this account. And just as we try to keep a minimum balance in our personal checking accounts, to ensure that even unexpected bills can be paid without exceeding available funds, we try to maintain a balance of "reserve" funds in the FCC checking account for the same reason. Over the past few years, as we've weathered fluctuations in income and expenses, the balance in our checking account has fluctuated widely, but with a persistent downward trend. In 2021, the January "reserve" balance of \$83,000 had dropped to \$71,000 by December. In 2022, these figures were \$65,000 and \$37,000 respectively (the result of two years of deficit spending). This year, the reserve balance has been as low as \$13,000 but by the end of September was \$47,000.

The church's financial team (Trustees, Treasurer, and Financial Secretary) have discussed this trend and determined that a minimal acceptable reserve in our checking account should be \$40,000—a figure approximately twice the amount of the church's average monthly expenses.

Given the likelihood that we will have to further supplement the General Fund checking account with monies from our savings and/or investments, the Trustees have implemented the following contingency plan:

If the balance in FCC's checking account falls below \$40,000 and remains there for 2-3 weeks, we will transfer undesignated monies from our savings account in \$10,000 increments as needed, beginning with the bequests of Don and Pat Gustofsen, Thelma Miller, Olene Dowell, and Bob and Mary Fitz (in this order).

We will report further on this plan, and its impacts, in the November issue of The Call.

Preparing the 2024 Budget: The trustees faced considerable challenges in developing a 2024 budget. The cost of property and liability insurance increased some \$5,000 (per year) during our last policy renewal (in April 2023). The cost of gas and electricity also continues to rise steadily. Despite these unavoidable cost increases, we have proposed and the General Board approved a budget that is 1% lower than the current year's budget. We appreciate the ongoing cooperation of staff and committee chairs who helped us to identify ways to contain costs. The 2024 budget will be shared in the annual mailing from the Stewardship Committee, as well as in the November issue of The Call, prior to the Annual Congregational meeting in December.

Annual update letter to our donors: By now, you should have received the letter that is mailed from the church office to all those who have made financial gifts to the church during the current year, providing donors with a record of what they have given (through August 30). If you haven't received your letter, please contact the church office and we

Remember the City of Ames has a compost program called the Food Waste Diversion (FWD) program. *"Reducing the amount of organics we throw away is important. A tremendous amount of natural resources and energy are used to grow, process, package, and transport food," explains Bill Schmitt, Resource Recovery Plant Superintendent. "Food waste that goes to landfills generates methane, a harmful greenhouse gas." The FWD disposal site is located at the Resource Recovery Plant, 420 E 2nd Street, (on the northeast corner of the building). Solar Energy Technologies Office

The amount of sunlight that strikes the earth's surface in an hour and a half is enough to handle the entire world's energy consumption for a full year. Solar technologies convert sunlight into electrical energy either through photovoltaic (PV) panels or through mirrors that concentrate solar radiation. This energy can be used to generate electricity or be stored in batteries or thermal storage.

Solar energy can help to reduce the cost of electricity, contribute to a resilient electrical grid, create jobs and spur economic growth, generate back-up power for nighttime and outages when paired with storage, and operate at similar efficiency on both small and large scales.

- Benefits and limitations of solar energy:
- 🛉 Using solar energy has two main benefits:
- Solar energy systems do not produce air pollutants or carbon dioxide.
- [†] Solar energy systems on buildings have minimal effects on the environment.
- Solar energy also has some limitations:
- The availability and amount of sunlight that arrives at the earth's surface varies depending on time of day, location, season of the year, and weather conditions.
- The amount of sunlight reaching a square foot of the earth's surface is relatively small, so a large surface area is necessary to absorb or collect enough energy to be useful.

n Sunday, October 8, the annual CROP Walk was celebrated once again in the greater Ames area. Sponsored by Church World Service, a cooperative ministry of 37 Christian denominations and communions, this major fund-raising event supports food security, sustainable self-help, development, and emergency relief around the world.

This year, 8 members and friends of First Christian Church joined in the community walk at Ada Hayden Park, which is ultimately a symbolic gesture, honoring people worldwide who *must* walk—every day, and for great distances—to find water and food. In addition to walking, team members worked to raise money through sponsorships—encouraging family and friends to open their hearts and dig deep into their pockets. Our team goal this year had been to raise \$2,000, and on the morning of the walk, FCC was very close to reaching our goal. Thanks to an outpouring of amazing generosity from our First Christian Church congregation during worship that morning, the FCC Team did meet *and* surpass our goal. Together, we raised \$2,365. What a wonderful total to celebrate!

As in years past, 25% of the funds raised in the Ames-area CROP Walk will be distributed to local agencies involved in food security and hunger relief, including our own ministry partner, Food at First. The remaining funds are used by Church World Service in a variety of relief and development programs across the globe.



An Update from the Krebs:

"We so feel the love of our church family with many messages, cards, thoughts, hugs, and prayers. The Lord is good!"— Cathy Krebs

On October 13, 2023, Derek Krebs had to undergo surgery for a brain tumor that was behind his eye. At the time, it was expected the tumor to most likely be benign but it was still unknown. The surgery took many hours, and thankfully it went well.

While in recovery and awaiting pathology and MRI results, Derek's visits were restricted due to COVID guidelines. He had a painful first night, but was soon back to eating and walking short distances with assistance.

After this long ordeal, both MRI and pathology reports have shown Derek's tumor to be fully removed, with no remainder cells. Derek received a message from his doctor saying that the pathology report on his tumor came back. The tumor is good, "it's the most benign kind of meningioma, grade I. Nothing else needs to be done to treat this."

Stitches from brain surgery were removed yesterday (October 23rd). The pathology report was received from his Iowa City neurosurgeon. The tumor was benign!! All of your prayers and positive vibes are so greatly appreciated. Derek experiences mild headaches which was anticipated due to the surgical procedures; however, they are now managed with non-prescription pain meds. At this time, no further treatment is required related to the removal of the meningioma brain tumor. He still has extreme fatigue which will take 6 to 8 weeks to subside. We will be heading back to the University of Iowa hospital next week to repeat an MRI and consult with an ENT surgeon to further evaluate the fluid that remained in his left ear. Thank you all for the support through prayers, thoughts, love, cards, calls, meals, and goodies given to Derek and to our family as we journeyed together during his recent health challenge.

We continue to hold Derek and his family in our prayers, and wish him a speedy recovery.
